Knowledge corner

This month culminates in Holy Week and the Great Triduum (Three Days) of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter. 'Maundy' has roots in the Latin 'mandatum' or 'commandment'. This is the day Jesus gave us the great commandment, to love one another (Jn 13:34). We signal that love through washing the feet of others. This evening also celebrates the Last Supper, or first eucharist. That important service ends with the stripping of the altar of the church, leaving it bare and exposed, representing how Christ was stripped before his crucifixion.

The two services on Good Friday represent different ways to be with Jesus at the cross: the ecumenical walk in the morning, and the Anglican service in the afternoon.

The Easter Vigil service is the most dramatic of any service in the Christian Church: we light the new fire, baptise, and proclaim Christ's resurrection with bells and joy.

Please plan to walk these three days together.

together with Jack Prima, moved furniture and appliances again, and again, and again. Essie Leech and Wendy have scrubbed the cupboards in the kitchen, and some of the old appliances have gone to their final resting place, thanks to Ross. Christine has also improved the appearance of the entry doors. Thanks also to Tony Fry for exterior help at both churches, Stephen Lea, and Ian Hanna's staff, as well as a few anonymous helpers. Thanks also to Sue and Richard Hancock for all the gardening work at St Peter's, eliminating the noxious plants. There's more gardening once the rain starts.

A massive thank you to **Norm Cave** who fashioned the new freestanding altar out of timber salvaged from the walls of St Peter's. (See the article and photo below). See the sidebar on the left for other donors who have contributed to the renovations and maintenance

There is still important structural repair work to be done at St Peter's. The frame of the large window at the west (entry) end to the church needs significant repair, because it has been leaking for years. This will be an expensive fix, and the decision was made to defer it for a few months while we find the money. There is still some exterior repair work to address, mostly related to age and rot. They are on the list!

New freestanding altar to trial at St Peter's

St Peter's is trialling a new altar. The new altar will not replace the existing altar, but will be placed in the crossing (the space in front of the steps to the high altar) and will be used routinely on Sundays. It is on wheels, so can easily be moved for weddings, funerals, performances, and other large events. It is constructed out of wood recovered from the renovation of the church, so is both sustainable and very sympathetic to the architecture of the church. It is also constructed so that the high altar can easily be seen beyond it. On entering the church, the eye of the viewer remains drawn to the high altar, and only gradually does the freestanding altar become visible.

Why trial a new altar? There are several reasons: firstly, it recovers the ancient church tradition of locating the action of the eucharist in the midst of the people where it belongs. There is no longer a very great distance between the presider at the altar and the people. The congregation can now see and more actively participate in the action. Perhaps even more importantly, the congregation can hear the presider, since the presider will be standing in the midst of the people. There will be no need for ministers or people to go up any steps, so the new altar will be very accessible to anyone who uses a wheelchair or who feels unsteady on their feet.

There are a couple of other adjustments. The candles on the high altar will remain on that altar, as will the seasonal hangings. We have pillar candles (which are lower and 'fatter' than taper candles, so more proportionate) for the freestanding altar. Seating in the congregation will similar to the previous arrangement, but in a slightly more semicircular arrangement to support easier hearing of the service. Most of the seating will be in chairs, which will allow for greater flexibility of arrangement.

What do we mean by trial? Any change to the interior of a church must be approved by the Diocese through a process called a 'faculty'—the renovation is an example of a very significant faculty. If the faculty is granted then the altar will be installed and eventually be consecrated by the bishop on his next visit, so it requires the Bishop's permission.



The Worship and Liturgy Committee, the Parish Council and the Wardens of BBAMD have all supported the Facutly application, as has the archdeacon. We will trial the new arrangement to see how it will work best for us while we await the outcome of the Faculty Committee. Norm has done a stunning job for the church, and we encourage you to come and trial it out.

New altar in Norm Cave's workshop
