Knowledge corner

Why bless animals?

God of course was the first to bless animals at their creation (Gen 1:22, 28) and gave the first human creature the responsibility of naming and caring for animals. In Gen 9 animals are saved from the great flood, and animals such as whales, ravens, sheep, rams, bulls and goats—even a talking donkey (Num 22:21-39)!—appear throughout scripture.

Throughout history, as now, livestock represented a family's wealth. The Church has blessed animals since St Anthony of Egypt (ca 251-356 CE) blessed a sick piglet (which recovered instantly, of course). Anthony has since been regarded as the patron of livestock. Some churches still bless animals on 17 January, St Anthony's feast day.

St Francis (see the top of p. 2) composed his Canticle of the Sun (Canticle of the Sun; it appears as #406 and 407 in the Hymnal 1982 of the Episcopal Church) about 1225, which praised the interrelatedness of all creation. Thus, Francis became associated with creation, ecology and environment. Ironically, Anthony was strictly vegetarian, while Francis was not! Prayers for animals praise their role in meeting human need, not only in assisting in work, but in providing clothing and food. We also recognise the role animals play in meeting human emotional needs for attachments, and to share love. Teaching children to respect and love animals is often the first experience children have in loving outside their immediate family. Children learn to care for their environment. That's why we bring along pets (and even stuffed animals) for blessings on St Francis Day.

From your Vestry

The Parish Council held its annual planning retreat on 13 September at St Paul's, and held its business meeting 25 September at St Peter's.

At the all-day planning retreat on 13/9, members of your Council recalled what led them to the Anglican Church, and how they might use that to support others to discover the church. We heard that the average age of ACBB parishioners is 76.7 years as of 1 September, and debated whether the parish should remain open and plan for an active future, or to consider a gradual planned restructure, merger with other ministry units, or closing. It is clear whatever our future, it will look different from our past. We outlined key priorities for 2026 in the areas of worship, outreach, pastoral care and finance and fundraising. The day was bracketed in prayer, and the general feeling was that it was a constructive day. A full plan will be drafted and presented to the membership for review and comment.

At the **business meeting** on 25/9 the Council made the important decision to change the name from Parish Council to Vestry. This is because 'vestry' is used around the Diocese, in the Parish Statute 2024, and better reflects our parish status.

In addition to the usual financial and health and safety business, the Vestry heard reports about Diocesan Synod, confirmed the dates of the Christmas Tree festival at St Peter's (17-22/12), and addressed current challenges and developments in the Foodbank. There is now much more regional collaboration among the four churches providing community food assistance. The Op Shop relocation was discussed, although there is no plan currently in place. Geotechnical surveys of the 8-10 Nova Scotia Dr. site are required. Op Shop donations to the Waipū Fishing Club, Ruakaka Surf Club and Men's Shed were approved.

Worship is very busy from October through December, including the Blessing of Animals, All Saints, Advent and Christmas Eve and Day. The times of Christmas services was confirmed.

The next Vestry meeting will be 27 November at St Paul's.

Approved Vestry minutes are available in a binder at each church.



Diocesan Synod met 4-6 September at Holy Trinity Cathedral, Auckland. ACBB Synod Representatives Sally Haigh and James MacGee will report back to the congregation on their experiences.

Blessing of Animal Service in the Season of Creation




Brenda Leeuwenberg will be the speaker at our annual Blessing of Animals service, held in the St Paul's Hall on 5 October, the Sunday closest to St Francis' Day (4 October).

Francis (1181-1226) was born in Assisi, Italy. After a frivolous life he rejected his inheritance and completely embraced poverty, rejecting material possessions and security. Others gathered around him and he began preaching tours. Francis developed a simple rule of life in 1210, and the Order of

Friars Minor was born; it was recognised by Honorius III in 1223. The order grew rapidly throughout Europe and beyond. In the final two years of his life Francis received the

stigmata, the marks of crucifixion nails, in his palms. He was canonised only two years after his death. Francis is considered the patron saint of both animals and the environment. This year, during the Season of Creation, we highlight the environment
